Kuspuk School District will make every effort to be flexible when scheduling meetings, and all of them will also be broadcast through ZOOM, for those who are unable to attend in person. Through past surveys KSD has been informed that parents, family members, and community members prefer to have a call in number for ZOOM meetings. Therefore, a call-in number is always published with the meeting agenda.

Our Compact is introduced during the 1st quarter parent-teacher conferences. The compact explains the ways the school staff, parents, and students work together to increase student achievement. Parent input and feedback is sought. A final copy has been uploaded to the district/school website.

Input from parents and families is welcome at meetings, in writing, and through emails to the school principal. Evaluations/feedback are also available at all Title I events and parents suggestions are collected at that time.
