

Dear Auntie Mary Nicoli Elem. School Parent

In August, the state Department of Education & Early Development announced our school's standing with regards to meeting federal requirements for Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) for state tests taken in Spring 2012. The **Auntie Mary Nicoli Elementary School DID MEET AYP.**

Under No Child Left Behind (NCLB), each state sets AYP goals for the percent of students that must be proficient on the state tests (Standards Based Assessment or SBAs) each year. By 2014, the AYP goal is that 100% of the students will be proficient on language arts (reading & writing) and math. For 2011 – 2012, Alaska's AYP goals for the percent of students that score proficient or above were: **Language Arts – 82.88 % and Math – 74.57%**. In order to make AYP, each of the following subgroups of students must meet the AYP goals: ethnicity, economically disadvantaged, students with disabilities, and students with limited English language proficiency. Schools must also meet an additional requirement of graduation rate of 85% (if they have students who were scheduled for graduation) **OR attendance rate of 85%** (for schools with no students eligible for graduation).

At **Auntie Mary Nicoli Elementary School**, performance of the following subgroups is being reported:

- The School As A Whole
- Alaska Native & American Indian
- Economically Disadvantaged
- African American
- Caucasian
- Students with Disabilities
- Asian
- Multi-ethnic
- Limited English Proficient
- Hispanic

The AYP goals will increase in future years until all students are required to be proficient in 2014. In addition to AYP, each school as a whole and the subgroups must meet a participation rate for testing. 95% of students in a school must participate in testing for the school to meet AYP. We are pleased that **Auntie Mary Nicoli Elementary School did meet AYP for participation.**

For 2011-2012, **Auntie Mary Nicoli Elementary School did meet Adequate Yearly Progress for attendance rate with a rate of 90.74%.**

For 2011-2012, **Auntie Mary Nicoli Elementary School did meet Adequate Yearly Progress for Mathematics and Language Arts. Safe Harbor and Confidence Interval helped us make AYP in some of these categories.**

Safe Harbor means that even though one or more of our subgroups of students did not meet the stated AYP goals, because the number of students who were not proficient decreased by at least ten percent from the prior year, the "safe harbor" provision allows the school to meet AYP. This helped us make AYP in Language Arts.

Because of our small number of students tested, a "**Confidence Interval**" percentage (depending on the number of students) is added to the percent of students proficient. This adjusted percentage is then used to determine if the school has reached the AYP targets listed above. This helped us make AYP in Mathematics.

Following is a summary of the student groups and the percentage of proficient students:

Student Group	Performance Area	Students Proficient
School as a Whole	Language Arts	67% (Met AYP by Safe Harbor)
	Math	67% (Met AYP with Confidence Interval)
Alaska Native/American Indian	Language Arts	62% (Met AYP by Safe Harbor)
	Math	69% (Met AYP with Confidence Interval)

For other subgroups the proficiency percentage was not reported because of the small number tested.

I am very pleased at the performance of our students and teachers in meeting Adequate Yearly Progress. I hope you will join me in congratulating them for this achievement and that you will continue supporting our success next year. We still have a significant number of students who did not reach proficiency in both Language Arts and Math, so our goal is 100% proficiency for all students. The entire staff of Auntie Mary Nicoli Elementary is behind this goal and the efforts of parents, students and the district office to make it happen.

Even though our school is not designated as “in improvement,” it is important for our school to continue to improve so that we continue to make AYP and provide a quality education for all students. We are in the process of developing our **School Improvement Plan for Auntie Mary Nicoli Elementary** to identify ways to strengthen instructional and support programs. Our school will be focusing on ways to close achievement gaps and bring every student to proficiency in reading, writing and math. Parents and community members are invited and encouraged to be a part of this process.

District level AYP is not yet available. Specific information on how our students scored district wide will be included in the District Report Card to the Public which will be sent in the next few weeks.
